

Bate Will Appear In Benefit Game Tonight

• The Bate Bulldogs and the Hustonville Tigers meet tonight in a game at the Jennie Rogers gymnasium that is played for the benefit of the community swimming pool fund. Indications are that the contest will be a close and hard-fought one and that the outcome might not be determined before the final whistle.

Game time is 8 o'clock and the promoters of the affair say that the teams are evenly matched as to height and ability. The visitors defeated Stanford high Friday night and Coach Jack Johnson said that he has a balanced Hustonville team that employs a zone defense that should cause Bate no end of trouble.

Bate Coach Joe Gilliam scouted the Hustonville Tigers last Friday night and said that his Bulldogs would have to be at their best to win tonight's game.

The probable starting Bate lineup will be Joe Lewis and Charles Gray, guards; Joe Napier and Ralph Coulter, forwards; and Jesse Adams, center.

Only one game will be played and it will start promptly at 8 o'clock.

1-20-39 Bate Bulldogs Beat Rosenwald Of Lebanon 52-45

The Bate Bulldogs turned in an impressive performance as they outscored and outmaneuvered a strong Lebanon Rosenwald team last night in the Bate gym, winning 52 to 45. In winning the Batemen had to come from behind in the fourth quarter.

Bate outscored Rosenwald 14 to 7 in the first quarter and ran that lead to 20 to 7 early in the second. At this point the visitors came back strong and had cut the Bate lead to 28 to 21 at half-time.

It was in the third quarter that the locals really ran into trouble as they seemed almost helpless in shooting over the head of the Rosenwald zone defense. The visitors went ahead 38 to 32 as the fourth quarter opened.

During the last stanza Bate started using a full court press, stealing the ball and setting up plays that paid off in baskets. Jackie Lewis made a foul shot that tied the score at 45 all. Charlie Gray, a substitute, then hit a field that put the locals ahead to stay.

Donald Davis had 26, Lewis, 12, Doneghy, 7, Adams, 5, and Gray, 2. C. Cowherd led the visitors with 14 and Ernest Cooper got 10. Davis and Adams were top rebounders for Bate, getting 15 and 13 respectively. There was no preliminary game. Bate travels to Lexington Douglas Thursday night. In last night's game the Bate fouling average dropped back to 15.

Bate Wins Its 1st Road Game

The Bate Bulldogs won their first road game of the season Saturday night when they beat Mt. Sterling DuBois by a score of 65 to 38. The Batemen struck early and stayed on top all the way.

At the end of the first quarter they were leading, 14 to 3, and at the end of the half they were on top, 33 to 12. The third quarter was played almost evenly as Bate got 15 and DuBois got 13 in this period. The game actually resolved itself into a pretty good first half for Bate and a pretty good last half for DuBois.

Scoring for Bate was Napier 5, Adams 5, Coulter 15, Lewis 7, Gray 16, and Doran, 17.

The DuBois junior team defeated the Bate junior team, 34 to 14, in a preliminary game.

Bate made it ten out of 18 last night when they beat Lancaster Mason by a score of 87 to 47. Sparked by Adams, who scored six in the first quarter, the Batemen went ahead early and were never headed. They led at the quarter stops, 18 to 9, 36 to 22, and 64 to 31.

During the torrid second quarter Davis and Gray each got 10 points for the locals, most of them on intercepted passes. During the last quarter of play Coach Hawkins cleaned his bench and Teddy Doram's layups were outstanding. Charles Gray, who played his best game of the season, ripped the cords for 20 points, closely followed by Davis, who had 19. Other scoring was Doram, 12. Adams, 10. Coulter, 7. Doneghy, 6. The parents of the players and the cheerleaders are expected to be present for this game and a special section is being reserved for them. In a previous game this season the Stanford Lincoln five defeated Bate by a score of 64 to 57 and the locals will be trying to avenge that defeat and at the same time make a good showing for their parents tomorrow night.

Demons Drop Bate, 76-52

The Bate Bulldogs suffered their sixth loss to Lexington Douglas Friday night by a score of 76 to 52. The winners went on top early and led 14 to 6 at the end of the first quarter. They continued the blistering pace and were on top 37 to 16 at the half.

Morton led the winners during their 21-point third quarter scoring total as he personally tossed in 9 of them. Bate was stronger in the final quarter, and, led by Gray, who collected 16 in the stanza, outscored the bigger Douglas team, 22 to 18. But the damage had already been inflicted.

Bate High's Bulldogs used a sizzling hot 26-point second quarter as their big weapon in a 60-52 win over a slow starting Hustonville Tiger team last night in the Jennie Rogers gym. A balanced

Bate attack with four men scoring in double figures proved too much for Hustonville. However, the Tigers staged a courageous rally late in the game to slice a 16 point Bulldog lead to six before bowing out by eight.

A large crowd attending the Community Swimming Pool benefit game saw both teams start slow with cold shooting and erratic play. A low scoring first quarter ended with the score tied at 8-8.

However, the Bulldogs turned red hot in the second frame while the battling Tigers continued to have a bad night. With the Bate lads scorching the nets, the Dogs raced to a 34-19 halftime lead by outscoring Hustonville 26-11 in the second period. Coulter with nine points and Napier and Doran with eight each paced the Bulldog scoring spree.

Going into the third quarter the Tigers began to show better form with a pressing defense. But the Bulldogs playing steady basketball managed to protect a good lead and showed on top 42-31 when the quarter ended.

Bate turned on the steam again and raced to a 16 point lead at 51-35 with about 5:00 left in the game. Hustonville then bounced back to outscore Bate 10-1 and cut the lead to 52-45. The Tigers continued to show a great fighting spirit and got within six points at 56-50 before two quick Bate baskets settled the issue.

Leading the speedy and hustling Bulldog attack was Teddy Doran in a reserve role with 14 points. He was followed closely by Napier and Coulter with 12 each and Lewis with 10. Adams, who did a great job on the boards along with Coulter, chipped in with 8 points while Charles Grey added 4. Routt also saw action for Bate.

Hustonville was led by Cooper and Jeffries with 13 and 12 points respectively. This was well under the usual point production for these two Tiger netters. Other scoring for the losers was Johnson 10, Bogie 5, McCalister 5, Kirk 3, and Beard 4. Ellis and Purdom also saw action.

Bate's impressive win over a good Hustonville team, that carried a 16-4 record into the game, serves notice to the 45th District teams that the Bulldogs will be troublesome in this year's tourney.

The Bate High Band put on an excellent half time show for the large crowd. The benefit game was definitely a successful affair in all respects. Total gate receipts were \$170.00.

Bate In Second Win Over Lebanon Team

The Bate Bulldogs last night defeated Lebanon Rosenwald, 36 to 19, in a game played at Lebanon. The Batemen had previously defeated Lebanon 33 to 27, in an earlier season game.

In an overtime game at Berea last night the Bate Bulldogs were nudged by the Bereans, 54 to 52. The game was a dog eat dog affair from the start and the winners enjoyed a 16 to 15 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Batemen fought back and enjoyed a 29 to 27 advantage at halftime. In the third, the Bulldogs went on top 44 to 40, and early in the fourth moved to 48 to 40, but Berea fought back and tied the score at 52 all as the game ended.

Bate Impressive In Winning Last Home Game By 93 To 69

The Bate Bulldogs brought their home season to a whirlwind finish Friday night with an impressive victory over Owensboro Western, 93 to 69. The 93 points scored by the Bulldogs, who threatened to run out the scoreboard, was the largest number they have scored in a single game this season and the large home crowd was properly and pleasingly impressed with the performance.

The first half was a nip and tuck battle with never more than three points separating the teams. Owensboro had a narrow 22 to 21 lead at the first quarter, with Herschel Smith setting the pace with 12 points. Don Davis sank six straight free throws during the second frame and the Batemen nudged ahead, 40 to 38 as this quarter ended.

Nothing is known about what transpired in the dressing room at the halftime intermission but the Bulldogs came back an inspired team and outscored the opposition by 31 to 15 points. On numerous

occasions during this quarter the Batemen stole the ball and maneuvered downcourt to score as the coordinated efforts of the team started to show its full potential. Smith, of Western, missed most of this quarter because of fouls and Coach Moxley withheld him for the final stanza. But, even in the final quarter, the Batemen outscored the foe by four points.

Coach Hawkins emptied his bench during the last period after it had been too much Davis and Doneghy for Owensboro. These two seniors gave excellent performances for the home folks to remember them by. Doneghy thrilled the crowd with his accurate and fast passing and Davis made 10 of 12 free throws to lead the Bate scorers with 24. Doneghy had 23, Lewis 19, Groy 11, Adams and Napier 5 each, Wilhite 4, and Doran 2.

Owensboro's Herschel Smith was high for the night with 30, 20 of them in the first half. Other Owensboro scoring was Jackson 13,

Coach Joe Gilliam's speedy Bate Bulldogs roared to an 81 to 40 victory over a scrappy, but outmanned Lancaster Mason high school last night in Lancaster, warming up before their all-important game here Friday night at the Jennie Rogers gymnasium when they meet high ranking Lexington Douglas.

Bate started fast last night and, throwing up an airtight defense, rolled to a 23 to 2 lead at the end of the first quarter. Coach Gilliam substituted freely after the first stanza.

Jacide (Bomber) Lewis had an 11-point first quarter and Charles (Bugs) Gray connected for six. With substitutes sprinkling the lineup, Bate had a 25-point second quarter as Lancaster registered 11. Bate was on top 48 to 13 at halftime. The third quarter was almost even as Bate got 14 and yielded 13.

Bate had five players in double figures—Lewis had 19, Teddy Doram, Joe Routt and Ralph Coulter had 11 each, and Joe Napier got 10. Glen Gray had 4 and Glen Ball registered 3.

Douglas, playing here Friday night, ranks 14th in the state and lost to Lexington Dunbar by 64 to 60 on the Dunbar court last Tuesday night.

Worried Bulldogs Face Durham At 8

Tonight's game carded at 8 o'clock at the Jennie Rogers gymnasium against a tough Campbellsville Durham High school team is causing grey hairs in the head of Coach Gilliam of the Bate Bulldogs.

In an interview by the writer with the young Bate coach, it was noted that worried lines creased his brow when the subject of his team was discussed with reference to tonight's and previous games.

"Our boys definitely are not taking the game in the right frame of mind; they are sizing up teams too lightly and, with a contingent as small as Bate's, that just cannot be done," said the local coach.

"Campbellsville has a big team averaging around 6'2". Although they do not have a 'world of finesse' they just overpower you on the board. They gave us a sound whipping down there earlier this season," Gilliam added.

The coach was asked why his team had fouled so much in past games; the one and one foul situation has really let off Bate's chances of victory in many games this season. After out-fieldgoaling some teams, or holding them even on the field, Bate has lost most of these games by 10 to 12 points.

Looking over the last Campbellsville game, Gilliam pointed out that his team is a small one, that his boys are not using proper defensive tactics and perhaps are over-aggressive.

While he did not announce his starting line-up for tonight's game, Gilliam is expected to start Jesse Adams at center (Adams has failed to live up to expectations this season in scoring and defensive rebounding); Teddy Doran and John White, who is playing his last game on becoming 20 years old, at forwards, and Jackie Lewis, the only consistent scorer in double figures, and Charles Gray at guards.

The only hope for an upset by the Bate team is that they improve on their shooting percentage and free-throw shooting.

A junior varsity game will start at 6:45 o'clock tonight in the Rogers gym.

Bate Wins Thriller from McCreary Co.

Bate Bulldogs closed their playing season Friday

night by defeating a well-coached McCreary County team, 32 to 49, in a game that was one of the best played here this season.

Playing in the Jennie Rogers gymnasium, Coach Joe Gilliam's Bulldogs gave an exhibition of stamina, courage and know-how that was pleasing to the partisan crowd. The two teams both broke with terrific speed in an effort to wear down the opposition and to the spectator delight of the crowd.

The closeness of the game is illustrated by the fact that the first quarter ended with the two teams in a 9 all deadlock. This was the feeling out period and after it was over the fast break became the rule rather than the exception.

Captain Frazier, a 6' 1" center and a fierce competitor, led the visiting five to a 35 to 34 third quarter advantage. The overall Bate attack, that would not be denied, was led by five seniors. The Batemen had enjoyed a 21 to 12 halftime lead.

The Batemen stopped Frazier in the final stanza and that was the key to their win. He got one field goal in that period and Bate sub Joe Paul Route picked up ten key points. With 30 seconds left in the game the locals led by 50 to 47. Waverly hit two free throws to narrow the margin to one point. Bate then started a deep freeze and the visitors, in a frenzied attempt to get the ball, fouled Jackie Lewis and he made them both good.

With seven seconds remaining the visitors called time out as they trailed 32 to 49. The strategy was for Frazier to shoot and try to draw a foul, but Bate was not fouled and allowed him the ten-foot shot which he missed.

The five Bate seniors all ended their regular playing prep play by giving good accounts of themselves. Jackie Lewis led the Bate scorers with 15 points. Charles Gray had 12, Route 10, Jesse Adams 6, and R. Coulter 4. Joe Napier got 3, and Teddy Doran 2.

Glenn Ball, the sixth Bate senior, did not see action. The Bate standing for the season now stands at 16 won and 8 lost. Frazier led the visitors with 24 points.

Coach Thomas Camper's junior varsity defeated Richmond Junior high, 36 to 26. Ball had 13 and C. Coulter had 10 to lead the Baby Bulldogs.

Bate Loses Game To Lincoln 'Lions'

Bate suffered its fourth defeat at the hands of the Stanford Lincoln team in this week's game, when the Lincoln "Lions" were able to collect their seventh win. Bate took the lead at the beginning on a foul shot by Lewis, but never had the lead again. The Lions led the Bulldogs 14-4 at end of first quarter. The Lions roared to a 26-14 lead at the half. Bate made a vain effort after the intermission to outscore Lincoln 10-11 which was just enough to bring them within seven. In the last stanza, Bate pulled with four at the two-minute mark. This became the turning point, when Bate's defense faded. C. Brown, who was the biggest thorn in Bate's side, collected three quick baskets. The Bate defense faltered more and more at the end.

The game reminded the fans of the recent game Kentucky played against Georgia Tech. Coach Gilliam still is not satisfied with their performance especially with the forwards who only collected 12 points out of 40. The big question is, can the Bulldogs bark away from home?

Jackie Lewis was game's high scorer with 20 for Bate, while Clarence Brown led Lincoln with 13, Roy Herndon 11, Robert Coulter, 10.

Coach Camper's junior varsity took it on the chin 30-21.

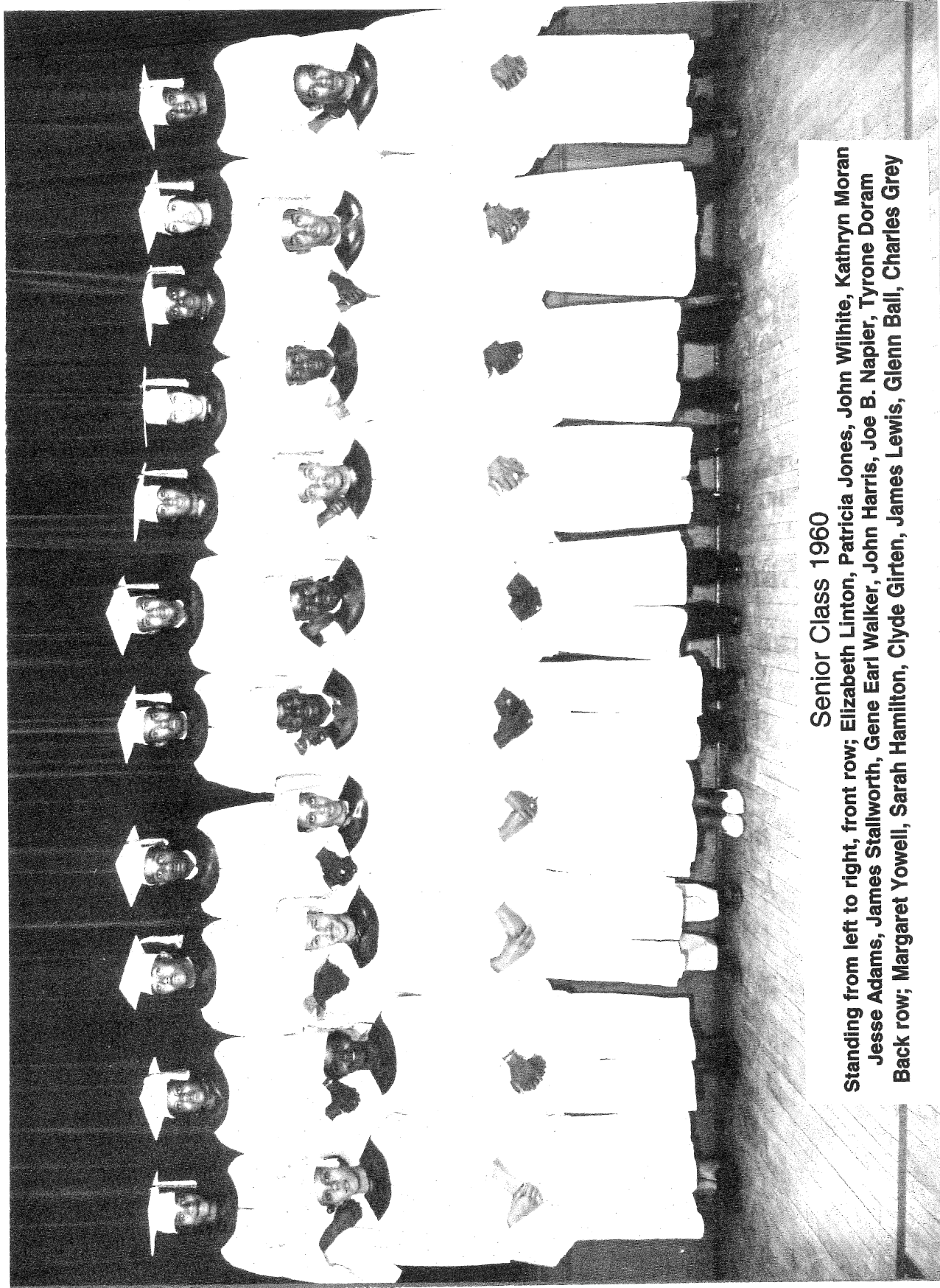

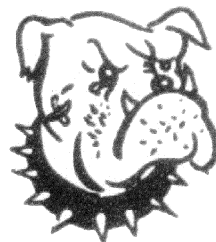

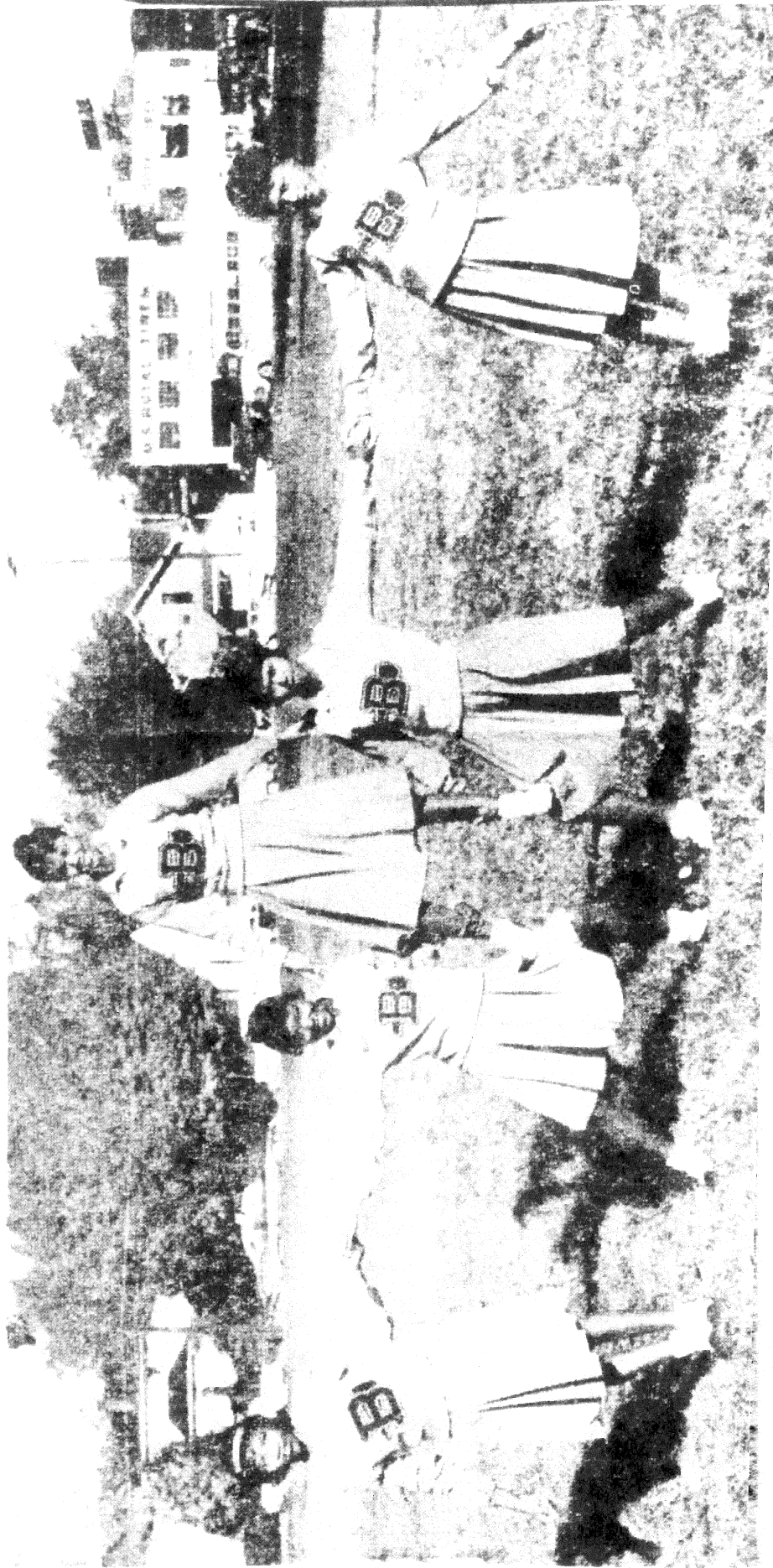

The Batemen were very sluggish and lacked aggressiveness through the first three quarters. The Bulldogs were cold in shooting from the outside and could not penetrate the tough zone defense. Bate was also whipped soundly in the rebound-

ing department through the first three quarters of the game.

The Bulldogs were beaten on the free throw line with both teams collecting 20 field goals for 40 points. Hustonville cashed in only 9 of 16 charity tosses for a very weak 47 per cent mark. However, Bate drew only five fouls from Hustonville in the game and made good on four of only six tries from the free throw line.

Being unable to get started Bate trailed the hustling and battling Tigers 17-12, 25-20 and 40-24 at the first three quarter stops. Bate tallied only four points in the third quarter while the Tigers got 15.

After trailing by 14 points going into the final frame the Bulldogs staged a terrific comeback when they finally came to life. The strong finish was sparked by phenomenal shooting and scoring of Chester Coulter who poured in 14 points in the final period. The Bulldogs sliced the Hustonville margin to 6 points (42-36) with 3:20 left in the game. But the rally proved too late and the Tigers hung on to take the win.

Hustonville was led in scoring by big Wayne Purdom and classy Nelson Graves with 14 points each. Along with his scoring Purdom was a tower of strength on the boards for the Tigers. Billy Hill collected 12 points. Feistritzer 5 and Galloway 4 to round out the Tiger scoring.

Bate was paced in scoring by Coulter who finished the game with 17 points after his big fourth quarter. No other Bulldog hit the double figures with Bruce scoring 8 points, Mayes 8, Fields 4, Otis Ford 4, and Harris 3.

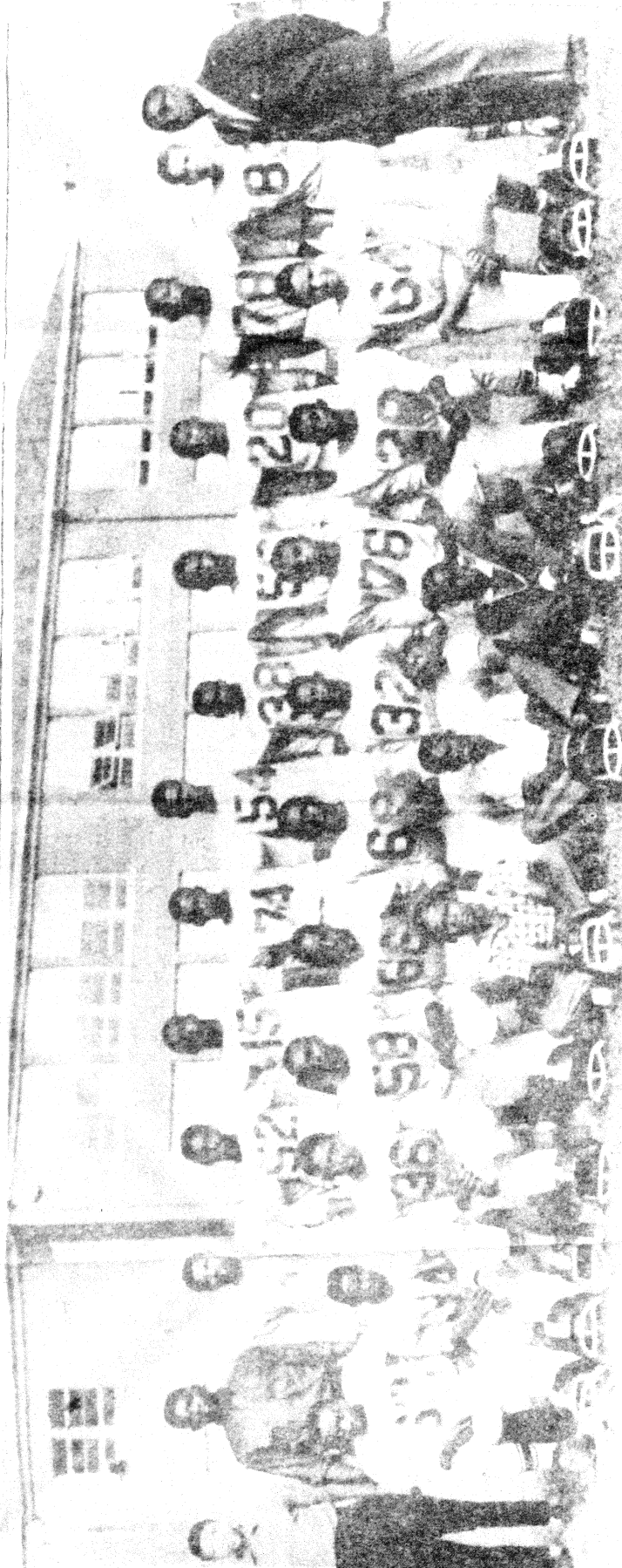


This is a copy of the card I gave out during my campaign for Student Council President in 1961, along with lollipops, ect. I WAS POWERFUL (Smile)
