Bate's Bulldogs, defending champion of the 45th District, made a big step toward their second straight crown when they downed Danville High's Admirals 63-53 Friday night in the lower bracket semi-finals. 





MR. ROBERT E. HARDING

Mr. Robert E. Harding's early education was at Bate High School where he was Valedictorian of the Class of 1945. A graduate of Kentucky State University (with honors and 1st in class), A.B., 1954 Sociology and Economics. Also the University of Kentucky Law School, J.D. (Juris Doctor), 1957.

From 1958-74, Mr. Harding was Attorney for the National Labor Relations Board. From 1974-76, he has been Instructor of Afro-American Studies at University of New Mexico, in Albuquerque, also was Instructor of Black Studies at Kirtland Air Force Base, Albuquerque, New Mexico and was Instructor of Black Studies, Albuquerque Public Schools.

Mr. Roach was a Teacher and Coach at Bate High School from 1938-41; Teacher and Coach at Dunbar High School in Lexington, Ky. from 1941-65; he served as Principal of Lexington Carver Elem. School, 1965-66; then was Principal of Lexington Jr. High School from 1966-75. He retired from the School System in 1975.

Mr. Roach is a Trustee and choir member of St. Paul A.M.E. Blacks urged to protect civil rights

For blacks, the legacy of the administration of former Presiden: Ronald Reagan has been the weakening of the strongest of civil rights, William L. Tucker told a large group of Bate High School alumni Saturday.

"He sought to turn the clock back to yesterday for black America," said Tucker, a 1951 graduate of Bate High School who spoke at Centre College's Norton Center for the Arts.

The alumni of Bate High School from 1916 until the school systems were integrated in 1964, have been meeting every three years since 1977.

Tucker, the executive director of public safety at Georgetown University, likened the experience of blacks today to the Reconstruction period following the Civil War. The same kind of statements are made, he said.

"We hear, 'Well, enough has been done," he said.

Blacks still need help to catch up, said Tucker, who retired after more than 20 years with the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, D.C. "One runner can't spot another runner 10 yards in a 100-yard dash and them run at the same speed and the other runner be expected to catch up." he said.

Tucker, who also was director of public safety and traffic for eight years at the University of Pittsburgh, backed his assessment of the predicament of blacks with some startling statistics.

In addition to dropout rates in high school being a problem, the number of blacks seeking higher education stopped growing in 1976, said Tucker, who holds a master's degree from the University of Pittsburgh and a bachelor's degree from American University. The number of blacks enrolled at the undergraduate level decreased by 76,554 from 1976 to 1985, he said.

The number of blacks receiving bachelor's degrees was 58,515 in 1976 compared to 54,920 in 1985, he said. Between 976 and 1985, the number of master's

degrees awarded to blacks declined by 31 percent, he said. Of 32,000 doctorate degrees given in 1985, blacks earned 820. Comparatively, blacks earned 1,096 doctorate degrees in 1976, he said. Of the blacks receiving doctorates, 60 percent were in the field of education. No blacks earned doctorates in fields such as engineering or astronomy, he said.

High unemployment is common among young black males, he said. Of black males under 25, 25 percent have never had a job, he said. One in six black males has been arrested by age 19, said Tucker, a specialist in police administration and crime prevention.

Blacks must become leaders to protect their rights, Tucker said. Despite the progress blacks have made, few are elected officials, he said. All 50 governors and 100 senators are white, and only 23 of 435 representatives are black, he said. Of 500,000 other elected officials across the country, 5,000 are black, he said.

Blacks must decide if they want their situation to change in the future, Tucker said. "We must ask ourselves, 'Will it be business as usual or will it be business anew?"

Just as blacks have struggled for integration in the past, so must they battle for equal rights in the future, Tucker advocated. "We have to struggle in the '90s to integrate the money — the green stuff." he said.

The Bate High School alumni association honored two members and former teachers at Bate for their service to the organization. Bertha Bowman of the class of '42 and Lucy Stephens of the class of '40 received plaques.

LaShana Harris, a 1989 graduate of Danville High School, was honored as the outstanding black graduate of the year. In accepting her honor, Harris thanked God. "For He allowed me to come this far and if it's His will, I will continue," said Harris. who graduated with one of the top 10 highest grade point averages in her class.

Harris, who earned a Commonwealth Diploma, the most advanced degree, plans to attend Spelman College in Atlanta, Ga. Coretta King, the widow of Martin Luther King Jr., attended the all-black women's school. She was one of 80 recipients of a \$4,000 scholarship from The Lexington Herald-Leader.

Harris has been working for local lawyer Deedra Benthall for more than a year. She acted as senior class president and as a senior was crowned Danville High School's first black homecoming queen.
