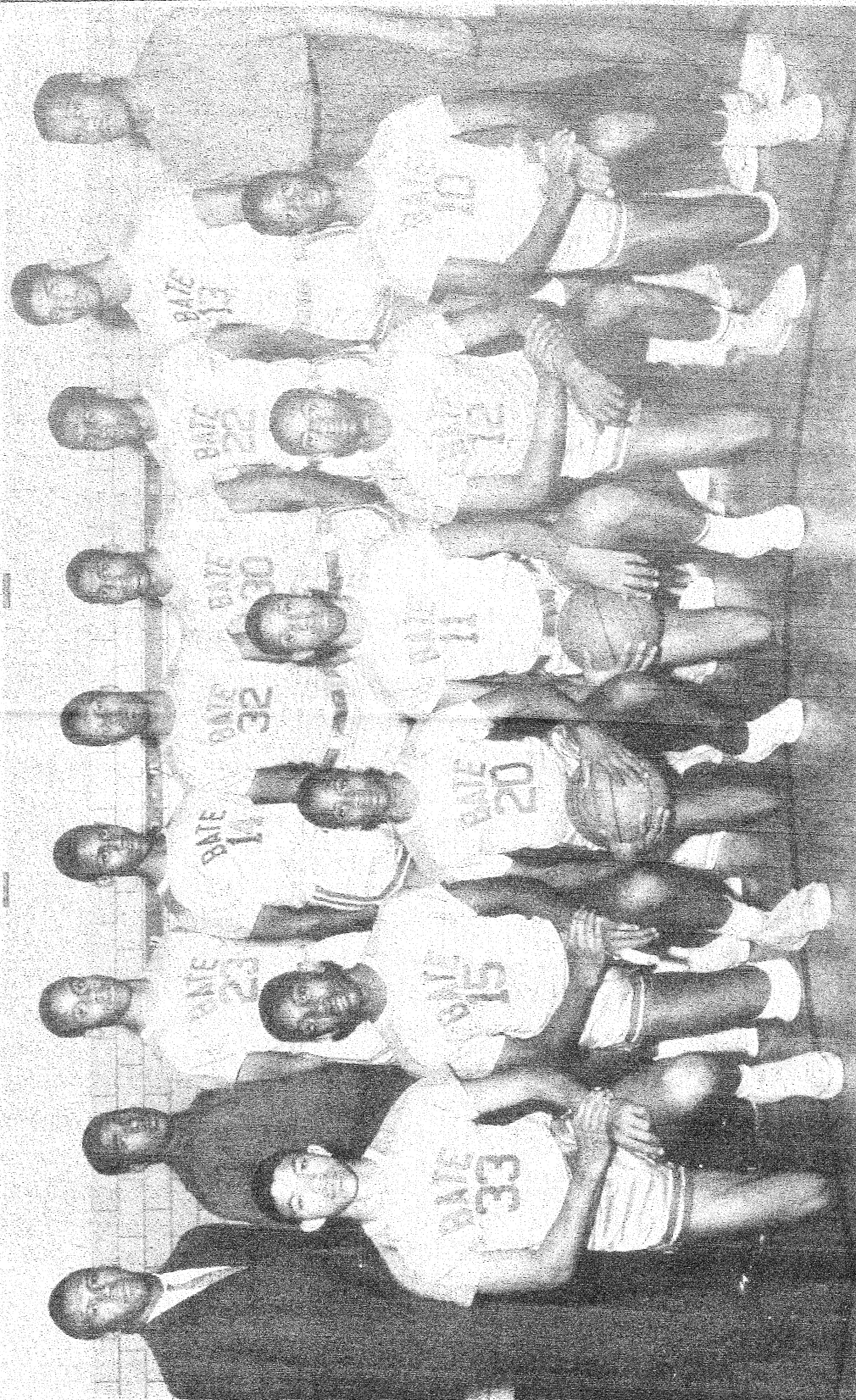

Bate's Bulldogs, defending champion of the 45th District, made a big step toward their second straight crown when they downed Danville High's Admirals 63-53 Friday night in the lower bracket semi-finals. A cold shooting Admiral team could never get started against the Bulldog's tough defense and steady offense.

Bate's victory advanced them into the finals against the Bucks.

The championship game was played last night and both teams will represent the 45th District in the 12th Regional tourney here next week regardless of the outcome.

Pairings for the Regional tourney will be held this afternoon

at 2:00 at the Boyle County High School.

Friday night's semi-final tilt was a hard-fought battle all the way. However, the steady performing Bulldogs were in command throughout the last half after grabbing a seven point lead late in the second quarter.

Bate grabbed an early lead in the game but the Admirals bounced back to race to an 8-3

edge with 4:15 left in the first period. Bate then retaliated with three quick buckets to regain the lead at 9-8 with 2:30 remaining. The two teams played on even terms for the rest of the period and the score was knotted 15-15 when the quarter

ended.

The Bulldogs grabbed the lead early in the second frame. But the Admirals rallied again to go on top 20-19 with 5:15 remaining in the period. However, the determined Bulldogs went in front to stay when they took a 26-23 edge with 3:50 left. Bate continued to spread the gap and built a 35-28 halftime lead.

Danville's ace scorer Jim P. Worter, averaging 22 points a game, was bottled up in the first half and failed to score a point. This was a key to the Bate halftime lead and the victory.

Bate broke away fast in the third quarter and took a commanding lead at 39-28 with 5:50 left in the period. The Bulldogs protected their margin through the rest of the frame although the Admirals did manage to trim the margin to eight points at 45-37 as the quarter ended.

The hard-working Bulldogs took their biggest lead at 54-41 with 4:45 left in the game. Here the Admirals made a gallant effort to catch up when they outscored Bate 10-2 and cut the lead to 56-51 with only two minutes left in the game. However, the Bate lead was too much to overcome and the rally fell short.

Bate's winning attack was led by Terry Bruce and Chester Coulter with 17 points each. They were given strong support by Fields who tallied 13 points. Steve Mayes added nine points and Harris seven to round out the Bate scoring. The Bulldog victory was definitely a team effort with all the cagers figuring heavily in the win.

Danville's attack was led by senior captain Jim Porter who tossed in a total of 20 point after being held to five in the first half. Banks Hudson, who carried the Admiral attack in the first half finished the gam with 14 points and John Chiwood tallied 10. Russ Sheare added six points, Smith Hurdley tallied two and Bob Anderson one to round out the scoring.

## Bate Plays Hustonville In 1st Session Of Regional At Boyle County Tuesday Night

The 12th regional basketball tournament will open at the spacious new Boyle County High school gymnasium Tuesday night at 7 o'clock when Hazel Green and London meet. Thirty minutes after the close of that game the Bate Bulldogs will meet Hustonville.

The four teams in the lower bracket will play Wednesday night as McCreary County meets Livingston in a 7 o'clock game and Pulaski County meets Buckeye in the nightcap.

The semi-finals in the upper bracket will be played Thursday night in a single game session that starts at 7:30 o'clock. The semis in the lower bracket will be played Friday night at 7:30 and the finals will be played Saturday night, starting at 7:30. Tournament Manager Roy Camie conducted a meeting of the coaches of the eight teams yesterday afternoon and all details and plans were worked out. Mr. Camie was authorized to appoint a scorekeeper and a timekeeper and he named Charley Harmon and Jess Tamme.

The coaches then voted on

several eligibles for tournament referees and selected Walt Green, Jimmy Brown, Roger Williams and Wayne Smith. It was announced that the price of tickets at the door will be \$1.00 per session and that advance ticket sales would be made to students and faculty members for 75 cents each.

It was also announced that the Danville Chamber of Commerce will set up and operate a hospitality room for the use and convenience of coaches, managers and others officially connected with the eight visiting teams.

Every aspect of the conduct of the tournament was discussed at the meeting which lasted for two hours and ended with every visiting coach satisfied with the detailed arrangements that had been made. Mr. Camie told the visitors that every effort is being made to conduct the tournament to the complete satisfaction of all participants and spectators. Details as to practice sessions for the teams, passes and complimentary tickets to the visiting team members and oth-

ers and dressing room accommodations for the teams were made at the meeting.

Coaches attending the meeting and representing the eight teams that will participate were Emmet Broadus, Bate; Dale Moore, Buckeye; Jack Johnson, Hustonville; Preston Purrott, Livingston; Jack Hissom, McCreary; Bob Randall, Pulaski county; Sam Karr, Hazel Green; and Gilbert Samples, London.

The teams that will participate in the tourney represent the winners and the runners-up in districts 45, 46, 47 and 48.

Members of the all-tournament team will receive trophies and the members of the winning and runner-up teams will receive gold and silver basketballs respectively.

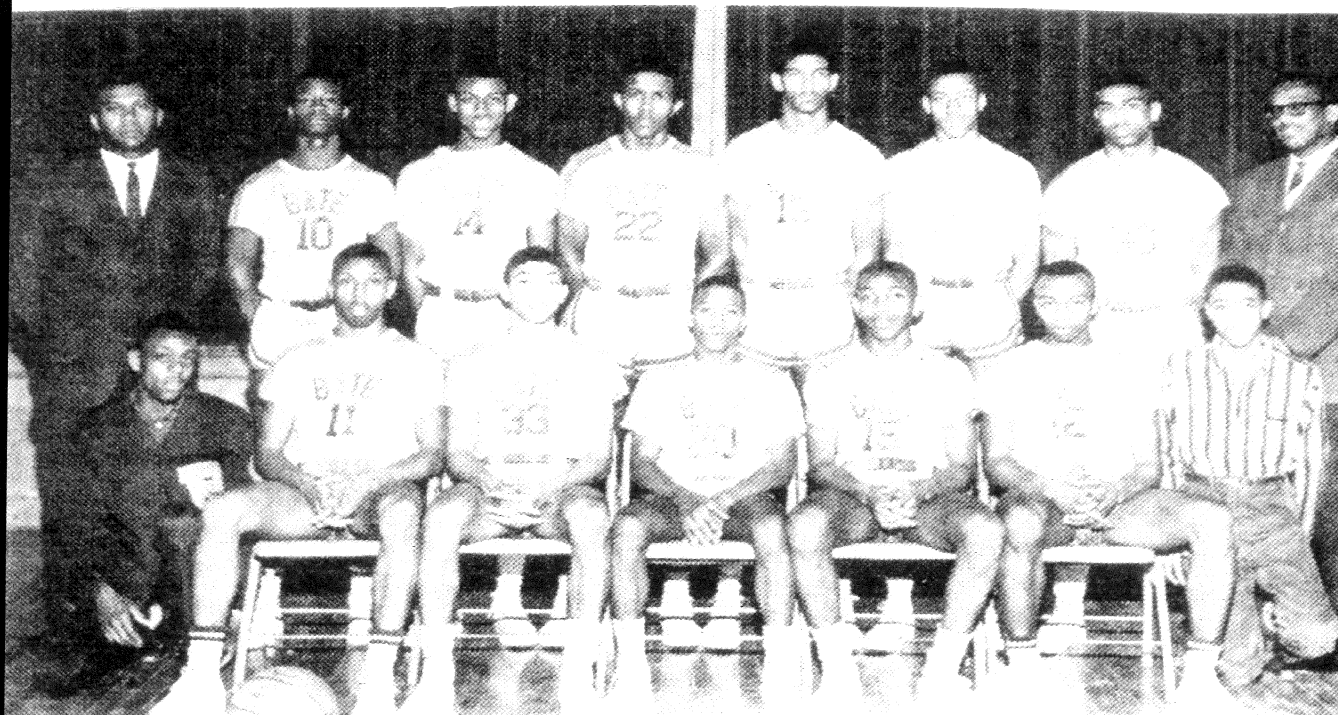

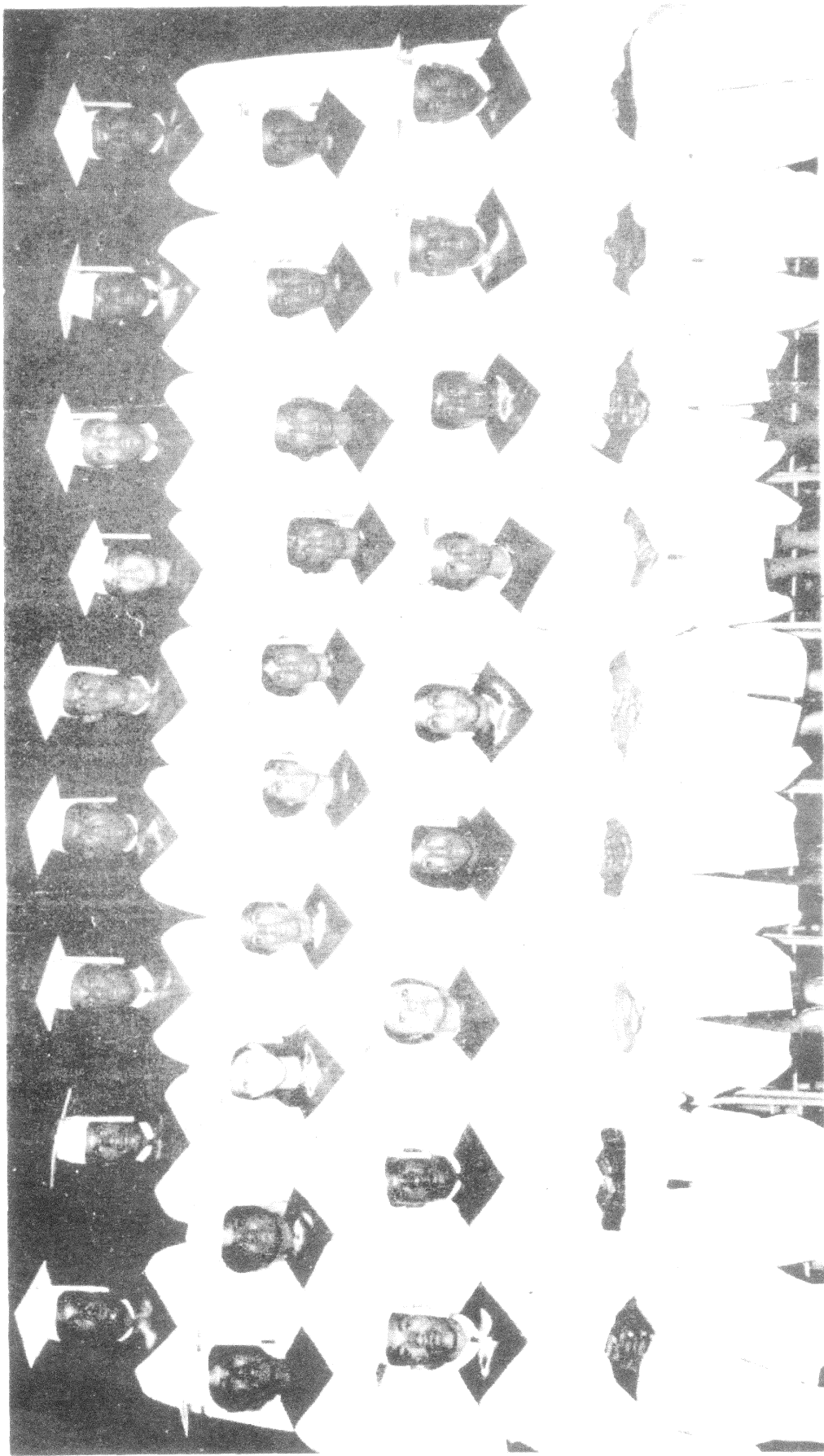

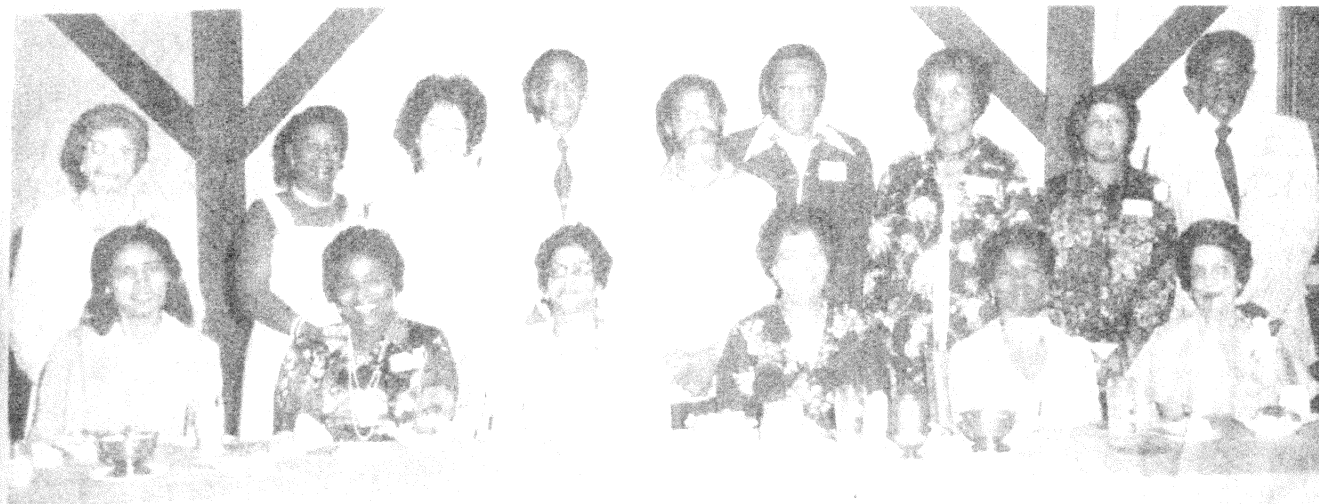

# Blacks urged to protect civil rights

For blacks, the legacy of the administration of former President Ronald Reagan has been the weakening of the strongest of civil rights, William L. Tucker told a large group of Bate High School alumni Saturday.

"He sought to turn the clock back to yesterday for black America," said Tucker, a 1951 graduate of Bate High School who spoke at Centre College's Norton Center for the Arts.

The alumni of Bate High School from 1916 until the school systems were integrated in 1964, have been meeting every three years since 1977.

Tucker, the executive director of public safety at Georgetown University, likened the experience of blacks today to the Reconstruction period following the Civil War. The same kind of statements are made, he said.

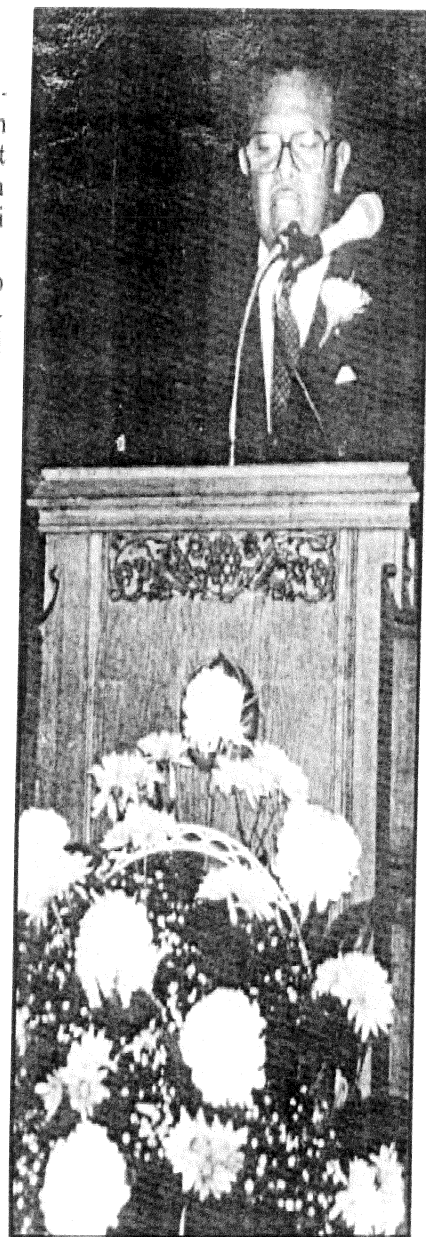
"We hear, 'Well, enough has been done,'" he said.

Blacks still need help to catch up, said Tucker, who retired after more than 20 years with the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, D.C. "One runner can't spot another runner 10 yards in a 100-yard dash and then run at the same speed and the other runner be expected to catch up," he said.

Tucker, who also was director of public safety and traffic for eight years at the University of Pittsburgh, backed his assessment of the predicament of blacks with some startling statistics.

In addition to dropout rates in high school being a problem, the number of blacks seeking higher education stopped growing in 1976, said Tucker, who holds a master's degree from the University of Pittsburgh and a bachelor's degree from American University. The number of blacks enrolled at the undergraduate level decreased by 76,554 from 1976 to 1985, he said.

The number of blacks receiving bachelor's degrees was 58,515 in 1976 compared to 54,920 in 1985, he said. Between 1976 and 1985, the number of master's

degrees awarded to blacks declined by 31 percent, he said. Of 32,000 doctorate degrees given in 1985, blacks earned 820. Comparatively, blacks earned 1,096 doctorate degrees in 1976, he said. Of the blacks receiving doctorates, 60 percent were in the field of education. No blacks earned doctorates in fields such as engineering or astronomy, he said.

High unemployment is common among young black males, he said. Of black males under 25, 25 percent have never had a job, he said. One in six black males has been arrested by age 19, said Tucker, a specialist in police administration and crime prevention.

Blacks must become leaders to protect their rights, Tucker said. Despite the progress blacks have made, few are elected officials, he said. All 50 governors and 100 senators are white, and only 23 of 435 representatives are black, he said. Of 500,000 other elected officials across the country, 5,000 are black, he said.

Blacks must decide if they want their situation to change in the future, Tucker said. "We must ask ourselves, 'Will it be business as usual or will it be business anew?'"

Just as blacks have struggled for integration in the past, so must they battle for equal rights in the future, Tucker advocated. "We have to struggle in the '90s to integrate the money — the green stuff," he said.

The Bate High School alumni association honored two members and former teachers at Bate for their service to the organization. Bertha Bowman of the class of '42 and Lucy Stephens of the class of '40 received plaques.

LaShana Harris, a 1989 graduate of Danville High School, was honored as the outstanding black graduate of the year. In accepting her honor, Harris thanked God. "For He allowed me to come this far and if it's His will, I will continue," said Harris, who graduated with one of the top 10 highest grade point averages in her class.

Harris, who earned a Commonwealth Diploma, the most advanced degree, plans to attend Spelman College in Atlanta, Ga. Coretta King, the widow of Martin Luther King Jr., attended the all-black women's school. She was one of 80 recipients of a \$4,000 scholarship from The Lexington Herald-Leader.

Harris has been working for local lawyer Deedra Benthall for more than a year. She acted as senior class president and as a senior was crowned Danville High School's first black homecoming queen.
