Mr. William C. Summers is our Principal. Being born in Danville, he is well known throughout the community and enjoys the respect of citizens and students alike.

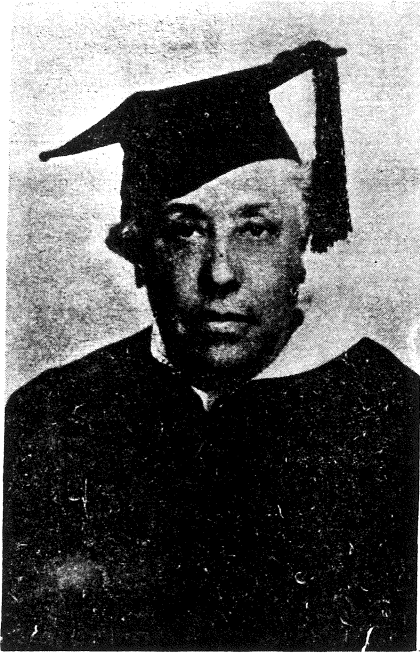

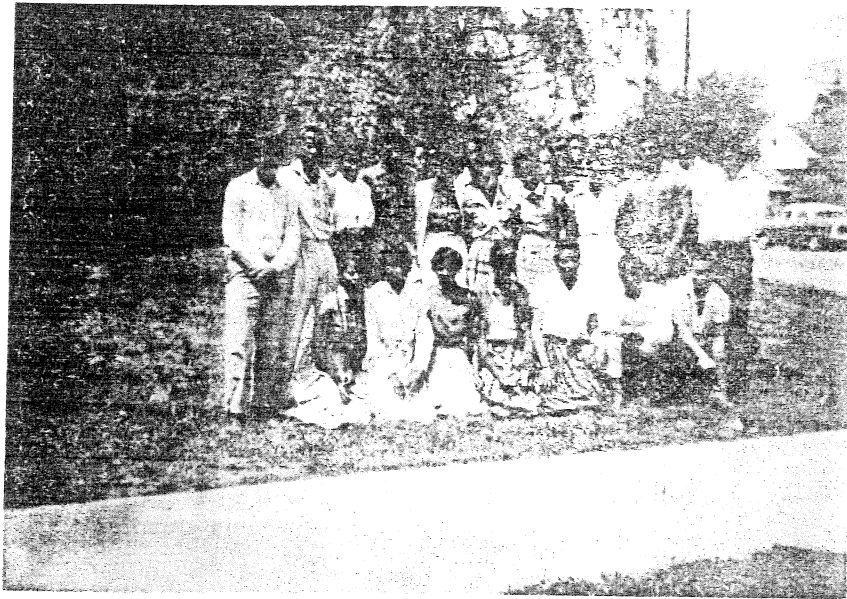
Student Council

Dramatics Club



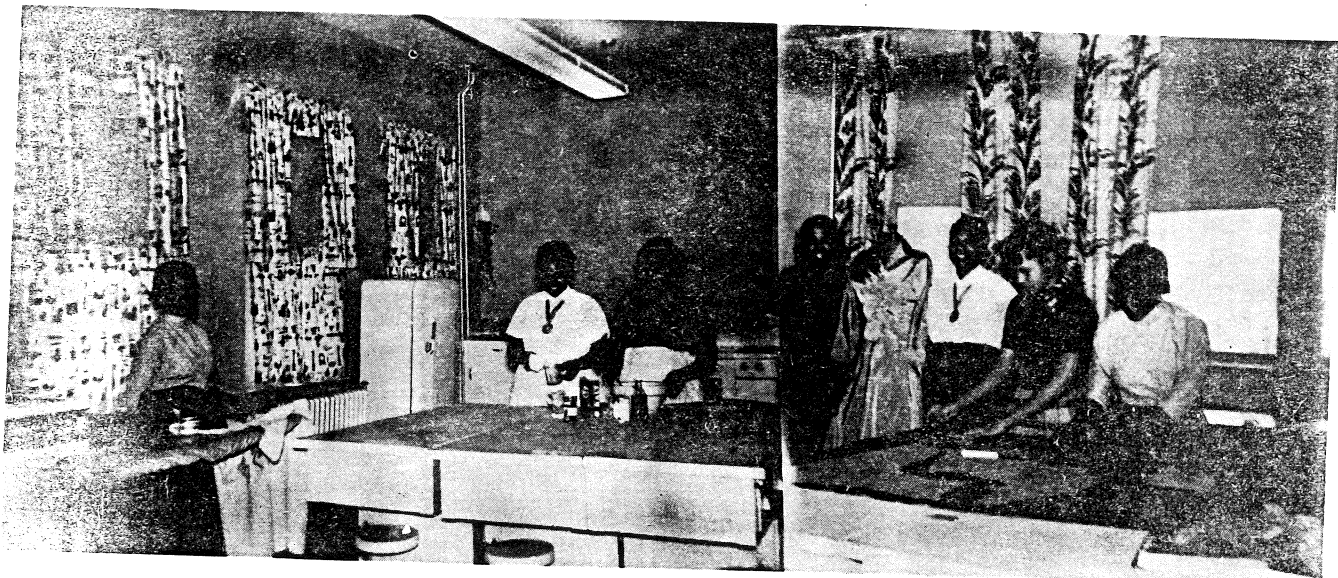
The Dramatics Club is an organization composed of students primarily interested in Speech. Its objectives are:

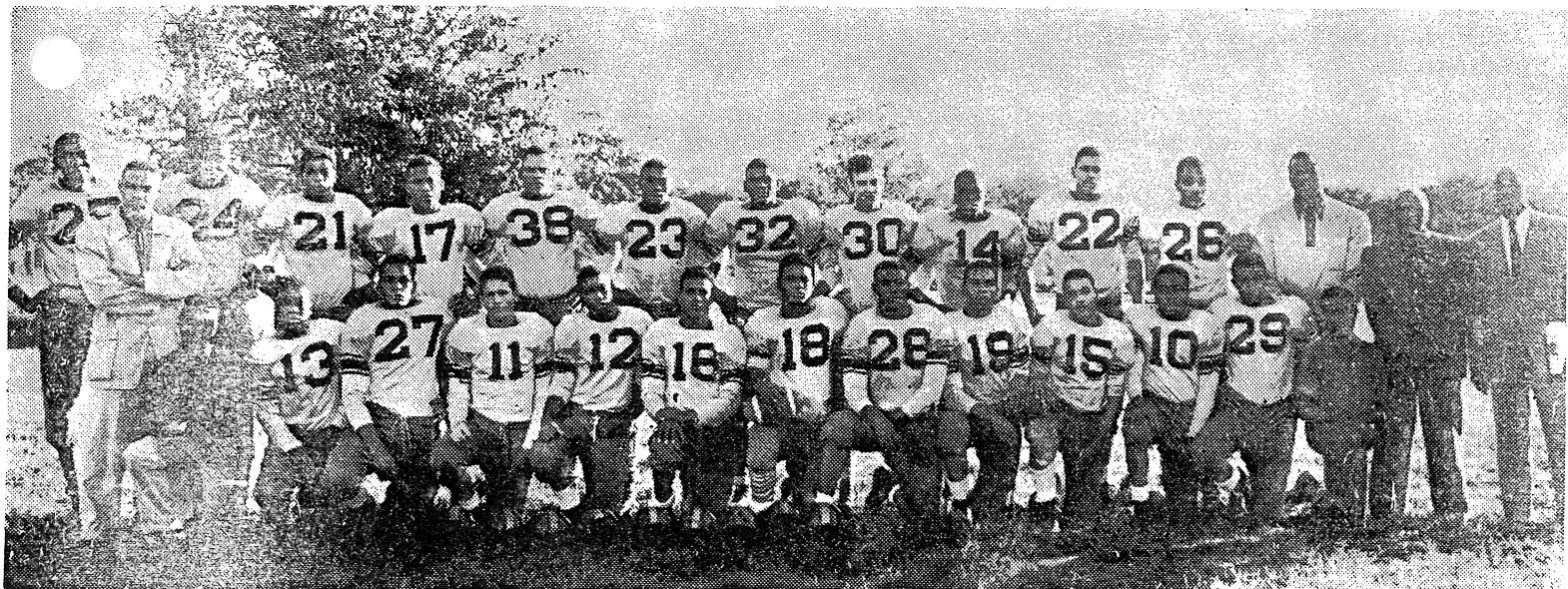

1954 Football Round-Up

Due to a late and slow strart, and without sufficient time for practice, the Bulldogs lost their opening game to a strong Wincherster Eleven, 34-21. However with aten-day practice before the season game, the Bulldogs flashed their winning form, smashing Catholic Hi of Louisville, 25-6; rolling on over Mount Sterling, 14-7; Paris, 20-0; Versailles, 20-0; and Georgetown, 26-6, to end a very successful season with 5 straight victories and one defeat.

Coach Hawkins says that every game was an outstanding team victory, with the boys playing hard and unselfishly. He considers the leadership and all-around play of Tailback, J. Davis and Center, W. Pittman as the difference between victory and defeat.

Much credit must go to the boys who performed in the line and for the most part, never receive the credit they deserve. Standouts in the line were: W. Pittman, C. Kinley, W. Pope, A. Napier, G. Penman, R. Warren, B. Garr, C. Singleton, and J. Adams. In the backfield, the play of J. Coulter, J. Davis, G. Bright, J. Whitley. Coach Hawkins considers the most improved players, G. Bright, J. Whitley, and B. Garr.

Bate finished third in the Blue Grass Conference behind the Champions, Dunbar Hi of Lexington and Winchester.

Arthur Napier, Guard, and William Pittman, Center, were chosen on the All-Conference team for two consecutive years, 1953-1953.



Bate Basketball Summary

The final curtain has been drawn on another great season for the Bate Bulldogs. During the season they electrified the spectators with a dazzling display of fine teamwork plus a hard-driving brand of ball that kept the spectators on their feet most of the time.

With the wonderful co-operation of the Coach and the boys, the Bulldogs have given us an excellent record of 16 wins and 5 losses. They also won the District D. Tournament and a spot in the State Sectional Tournament.

One of the most exciting games of the season was Bate's 75-74 win over Douglass Hi of Lexington, last year's State Champions. The most exciting loss was to Somerset 72-71. The best defensive games of the season were played against Ashland, a sharp shooting outfit. The Bulldogs defeated them twice—71-65 and 68-66. In gaining sweet revenge for the 72-71 loss to Somerset, the Bulldogs clicked like a well-oiled offensive machine to defeat Somerset, 90-70. The biggest upset of the season was with Western Hi of Paris, a team that Bate had defeated earlier in the season. The Bulldogs blew a 16 point lead and lost in an overtime 57-53.
