Mr. William C. Summers is our Principal. Being born in Danville, he is well known throughout the community and enjoys the respect of citizens and students alike.











THE LIBRARY

Dramatics Club




The Dramatics Club is an organization composed of students primarily interested in Speech. Its objectives are:


- (1) to increase the ability to read with expression,




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1954 Football Round-Up
