

DANVILLE NEWSPAPER "COLORED NOTES", 1943

The "Colored Notes" was a column that ran in the Lexington Herald from 1919 to 1937, in the Danville Messenger in 1932-33, and in the Danville Advocate-Messenger, from October 1942 to April 1968. It was the only outlet for social news for the African American community, as the only news the newspapers printed for Blacks was negative -- shootings, arrests, etc.

In the index that follows, the reader must consider several things:

- 1 -- Spellings are not always accurate or consistent, whether the fault of the reporter or the typesetter at the paper; I have transcribed them "as is."
- 2 -- People may well be mentioned multiple times in the same article; they are indexed once, if I notice this.
- 3 -- Sometimes, a husband is listed, or a wife. If both are inferred, I have added "M/M" to the name, meaning "Mr and Mrs".
- 4 -- Sometimes, a title is added to a man's or a couple's entry -- Rev, Pvt, Prof, etc.
- 5 -- First names are not always given; I have indicated these with "_____."
- 6 -- I have generally NOT indexed or downloaded the columns which contain no names, such as church announcements.

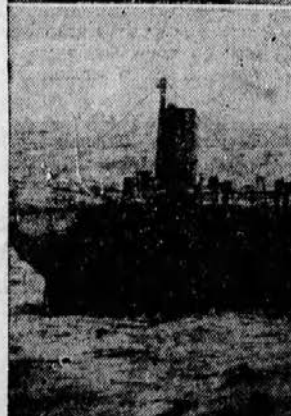

b. Substituted Home Economics, Woodwork, Sociology, and General Mathematics

4. The following clubs and committees are now important parts of the school program.

a. Clubs—Hi-Y, Girl Reserve, Home Ec., History, Science, Library, Choral, Adult, Junior Red Cross and School Co-operative.

b. Committees—Social, Beautifying, Athletic, Assembly, Cafeteria, School Newspaper and Discipline. (Students play an important part in the promotion of all activities.

Bate School looks forward to a successful school year, and sincerely desires to make the theme, "Improved Community Living," a reality. Bate School appreciates the efforts of the Board of Education, the Bate School PTA and other interested groups to make the school play its rightful part in building citizenship for this great nation.

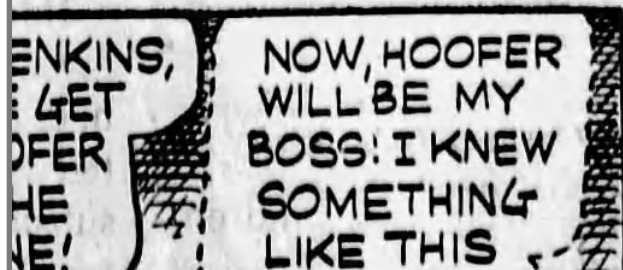
