DANVILLE COLORED NOTES, Lexington Herald

The "Colored Notes" was a column that ran in the Lexington Herald from 1919 to 1937, in the Danville Messenger in 1932-33, and in the Danville Advocate-Messenger, from October 1942 to April 1968. It was the only outlet for social news for the African American community, as the only news the newspapers printed for Blacks was negative -- shootings, arrests, etc.

In the index that follows, the reader must consider several things:

- 1 -- Spellings are not always accurate or consistent, whether the fault of the reporter or the typesetter at the paper; I have transcribed them "as is."
- 2 -- People may well be mentioned multiple times in the same article; they are indexed once, if I notice this.
- 3 -- Sometimes, a husband is listed, or a wife. If both are inferred, I have added "M/M" to the name, meaning "Mr and Mrs".
- 4 -- Sometimes, a title is added to a man's or a couple's entry -- Rev, Pvt, Prof, etc.
- 5 -- First names are not always given; I have indicated these with "_____."
- 6 -- I have generally NOT indexed or downloaded the columns which contain no names, such as church announcements.




